HOW TO RELEASE FISH WITH THE BEST CHANCE OF SURVIVAL

5 Rules (plus bonus rule) for safely releasing fish with the maximum chance of survival

Rule 1: Speed Does Not Kill

The faster you can get a fish to the boat or shore the better its chances of survival. The longer the fight the less chance the fish has of surviving.

It is likely that the survival rates decrease exponentially as fight time increases. That is as fight-time goes up, survival chances decrease at an ever increasing rate.

If you fish on a catch-and-release basis you should use gear that will minimize the fight time.

Rule 2: Get Wet

Lifting a fish out of the water, dramatically decreases its survival chances. The longer a fish is out of the water its chances of survival decrease exponentially. Try and remove the hook while the fish is in the water.

If it is not possible to remove the hook while the fish is still in the water use a landing-net with a wide mesh, and a mesh made out of soft material.

Rough, hard netting will remove slime and scales from the fish, which is its natural protection against parasites and infection.

On bigger saltwater fish, it may be necessary to use a gaff. If so, **try and gaff the fish from inside the mouth and out the lower jaw**.

Lay the fish on a wet towel or cloth while the hook is removed - covering the fish's eyes often helps to calm it down.

If you must touch the fish make sure your hands are wet or use a wet cloth or wet gloves between you and the fish.

Never touch a fish's gills, they are extremely delicate and just touching them can damage them.

If you must lift a fish in your hands, hold the fish under the gill latch in one hand, and just in front of the tail with the other.



The Death Grip - almost guaranteed to injure or kill the fish

Never, ever, not even once, lift a fish out of the water by holding the belly area. You will almost certainly damage internal organs. It reduces survival chances dramatically.

Never lay a trout on dry ground it will remove slime and allow the fish to be attacked by fungi and bacteria that can kill it.

Rule 3: Unhook Quickly

The longer you take over hook removal, the

less the chances of the fishes survival. The less care you take over removing the hook, the less chance of the fish surviving.

Use a pair of forceps, long-nosed pliers, or a purpose made hook-out to quickly and efficiently remove the hook. If the fish is deeply hooked back in the throat or stomach cut the line as close to the hook as possible and leave the hook in the fish - it will probably do more damage trying to remove a deep hook than leaving it where it is.

Never, ever, not even once try to remove a hook through the gills.

Barbless hooks are also much easier to remove and do far less damage. You can flatten a barb with parallel jawed pliers.

Do not use treble or double hooks - these can really damage a fish, and can be very hard to remove.

If you are saltwater fishing try using circle hooks, which hook up most often in the corner of the jaw, and are much easier to remove.

Rule 4: No Throwing

Throwing a fish back into the water is likely to greatly decrease the fish's chances of survival.

The major problem with tossing a fish back into the water is that the fish can go into shock, and float belly-up. In the sea this is an open invitation to predators to attack. In a river the current will take the fish downstream and away from any chance of re-catching it and of reviving it.

It is always better to gently cradle the fish in the water, until it moves off of its own accord.

In a boat have the boat move slowly ahead while the fish is held, in a river hold the fish into the current.

In both situations the fish will indicate it is OK by swimming out of your hands.

Rule 5: Avoid Photo Folly

If you must take a photo do it very quickly - remember every second the fish is out of water is reducing the chances of its survival.

Make sure the 'happy angler' has wet hands and holds the fish just in front of the tail and under the gill latch - never, ever, not even once, put a hand under the gill covers. Do not hold a hand under the stomach area, this will damage internal organs.

Don't pose and shoot - taking one shot, then reposing the shot and taking another, and so on will add to the time the fish is out of the water. Instead, just get the photographer to fire off a rapid series of ten or twelve shots in very quick succession - this is what the professionals do, and it is the reason they get better shots.

In these days of digital cameras there really is no excuse for taking one shot, re-posing...etc. Do the fish a favor and run off a 'bracket' of shots.

To repeat: never lay a trout on dry ground it will remove slime and allow the fish to be attacked by fungi and bacteria that can kill it.



Don't grip and kill

So, you have landed the fish as quickly as possible to limit capture stress and you are about to pick up the fish and a get a few 'grip and grin' shots before release.

But, grip and grin, can all too often turn into grip and kill, and it is all down to where you grip, and how you grip, the trout that can determine its survival. Read the full story here.

How long should you hold a fish out of the water? A fish has no lungs - the moment it comes out of the water it stops 'breathing". You should allow only

5 seconds holding a fish out of the water.

One hundred and two miles of the Arkansas River have just been designated as a Gold Water fishery. These clearly proves that those of us who love fishing the Arkansas River both above and below the town of Salida know this trip will be a good way to get the year started with a bang.

Room Accommodations: Aspen Leaf Lodge (<u>www.aspenleaflodge.com</u>) or 719-539-6733. Price for single is \$52.38 or two persons \$63.07 both include tax. The motel is about a half block from Ark Anglers right on Hwy 50. Trip captain will be staying here. No frills just the basic room. Everyone is responsible for making their own reservation, but I will help.

Camping/Trailer Option: A very short drive down river from Salida is the Four Seasons RV Park www.fourseasonsrvresort.com or 719-539-3084 where several HPD members will be staying. Sits on the banks of the Arkansas River. Take Hwy 50 out of town.

Food: Friday thru Sunday starts at the Patio Pancake Place located on Hwy 50 a few blocks from the Aspen Leaf Lodge. Meeting time is 7:30 a.m. Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Lunch is usually on the river and dinner meeting spots will be decided each day.

On-River-Clinic hosted by Ark Anglers: (SOLD OUT) Friday the 4th, meet at 10:30 am. What to expect: Meet at Ark Anglers and Stuart Andrews will then make fly suggestions (you do not have to buy flies) and then we head to the river. Stuart will be there to give advice, answer questions, watch your casting and basically be as helpful as he can. Many a time I have been fishing and doing zilch and said "I wish I had a guide here so I could ask…" Now's your chance. Contact Larry to make arrangements and to pay or visit the website. **Cutoff date is March 14th for clinic signup**.

Fishing: If a four day outing doesn't fit your schedule as long as we know you are coming up (even for a day) we will make sure you hook up with those of us who will be there ahead of you. This river has a great Caddis hatch, but often overlooked are the BWO hatches that happen in the earlier part of April so the action will be good.

Please visit the club web page http://www.hpd-fff.com/events/arkansas-river-salida/ and post a note showing your interest. We already have 20 members on board for this trip. I am planning to leave Denver early Thursday the 3rd and I will be glad to help you find a ride or a person to share a room with. If you have never fished the area please let me know and for sure those of us on the trip will be glad to share our knowledge of the river and the area. HPD is all about camaraderie on and off the river.

By the way if you should ask "What are **Gold Medal** waters?" These fishing areas have been designated by the Colorado Wildlife Commission as providing great spots to catch those large trout. These waters are defined as being able to produce 60 pounds of trout per acre, and at least twelve 14" or larger trout per acre. Only 322 miles of Colorado's 9000 miles of trout streams, and three lakes, carry the "Gold Medal" signature.

THE BUG GUY: ROBERT YOUNGHANZ

Bug Identification ½ Day Stream-side Class

Last year, our May HPD Club Meeting invited Robert Younghanz, The Bug Guy, as our guest speaker. We had approximately 40 members attend his 1 ½ hour presentation. Robert was very engaging and his tremendous (and very humorous) knowledge of Aquatic Entomology kept our attention and enthusiasm going all night! He guides, has authored several books and has close to 20 years in the Fly Fishing Industry!

Robert Younghanz, a.k.a The Bug Guy, has been involved in the Fly Fishing industry for close to 20 years. Having traveled to over 60 countries, he is an accomplished angler, teacher and guide for fresh, salt, tropical and warm water species. His passion and expertise in the field of Aquatic Entomology has enabled him to travel the world collecting Insects, as well as studying, researching, curating and teaching at Colorado State University, and Front Range Community College. In addition, Robert is a published researcher and has described several new species of aquatic insects. Robert has been a guest lecturer across the Western United States on the topic of Aquatic Entomology. As a contributing writer to Field and Stream's blog, "Fly Talk", "The Bug Guy" offers helpful advice on entomology and fly selection to fly fishers all over the globe. Robert is a featured presenter at the International Sportsman's Expo in Denver, CO, a Simms Ambassador Guide and has conducted entomology classes for both Simms and Orvis guides at their national gatherings, as well as for Trout Unlimited and other local organizations in the Rocky Mountain West. Robert teaches monthly lecture and streamside classes at The Angler's Covey Fly Shop in Colorado Springs. Look for Robert on WFN (The World Fishing Network) and online where he discusses insects, and well as fly fishing on Southern Colorado numerous rivers, lakes and reservoirs.

GUNNISON TRIP

June 1st - 8th

The multiple night trip to the Gunnison River will be held June 1-8, and will be led by Dale Anderson and myself. Dale plans to leave after Kids Day and be in Pleasure Park June 1-5. I will be there June 5-8. Members are welcome to join at any time during those dates. We will be using Gunnison River Expeditions for lodging and jet boat services. We have scheduled this trip to hopefully catch some of the Stonefly hatch or the Yellow Sallie, and Pleasure Park gives us the opportunity to jet boat into the Gunnison Gorge. One can also hike up or down river for excellent wade fishing.

Jet Boat Services

Gunnison River Expeditions has jet boat services available June 2nd-4th tentatively booked under Dale for the club and also June 7th-8th under myself for the club. They will not be available June 5th-6th. They allow for a maximum of 12 people per day to take personal water craft up the river and allow you to float down, and the fee is \$100 per person.

Lodging

At Pleasure Park they have 4 Camper Cabins that have two beds, no kitchen or running water for \$59 per night. They also have 6 large campsites that are \$12 per person per night. There is room for RV's, but no hook ups. There is also a bathhouse on site.

A lodge that holds 12 people is available, but it is about 10 miles from Pleasure Park. It has 6 bedrooms that sleep two per bedroom, with kitchen, bath, etc.
